## **Breast Cancer Awareness Month**

October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month, a time dedicated to raising awareness about breast cancer, supporting those affected by the disease, and promoting early detection through screenings.

Early detection is crucial in the fight against breast cancer. When breast cancer is caught at an early stage, the chances of successful treatment are significantly higher. Early detection can often identify the cancer before symptoms even appear, making it easier to treat and improving the survival rate.

Here are the key methods for early detection, regular self-examinations, while not a substitute for clinical screenings, it can help you notice any unusual changes. It's recommended for women in their 20s and 30s to have a clinical breast exam performed by healthcare providers every 1-3 years. Screening mammograms are recommended every two years starting at age 40, depending on individual risk factors. For women at higher risk (e.g., family history or genetic predisposition), a breast MRI may be recommended in addition to mammograms. This imaging method is sometimes used to further evaluate abnormalities found during a mammogram or clinical exam, especially in women with dense breast tissue.

Early detection combined with timely and appropriate treatment can save lives. It's important to have regular check-ups and consult healthcare providers about personal risk factors.
